Fall Reminders

With the school-year recently underway for most districts, and the initial rush hopefully settling into a more regular routine, now is an excellent time to revisit key ideas that guide the T-TESS process.

- T-TESS is rooted in a growth mindset which is captured by the oft-heard T-TESS phrase “It’s okay to be where you are; it’s not okay to stay there.”
- Closely related is the idea that the primary purpose of appraisal is to help us better understand what’s working, what’s not working, and what we can do to improve moving forward. As educators become more aware of their instructional practice, the self-reflection process embedded in T-TESS will also increase understanding about why something is or isn’t working and how it can be strengthened.

Whether your district is still early in their journey with T-TESS or not, revisiting these key ideas helps to ensure that T-TESS stays anchored as a collaborative and reflective system aimed at encouraging professional growth.
